BAND OF Excellence

Music is the soul of Louisiana and nowhere is that more true than in the New Orleans area. It has the power to inspire, to evoke memories, to teach and to heal. Jefferson Parish Sheriff Newell Normand is harnessing the power of music to do those things and more with the JPSO Band of Excellence.

The band, under the guidance of director Hezikiah Brinson and assistant director John Summers is in its infancy stages with approximately 30 members, but plans are to grow to 200 strong. Jefferson Parish youth between the ages of 13-19 are eligible to apply to the band.

The goals of this program are to develop a



community of support for the student, his or her family and neighborhood; to provide the student with the opportunity to earn credit in English and Math; and to expose the student to the culture, values and treasures of our community.

"The Band of Excellence is another way to reach the youth in Jefferson Parish. To give them a positive outlet to express their individuality and talent," Normand says. "One of

the most effective ways we can fight crime is to prevent it in the first place by giving youth positive opportunities to succeed."

With success in other youth outreach programs such as the Young Marines and the Jefferson Parish Cops and Clergy Coalition (JPCCC), Normand wanted to create a program that emphasized the area's rich musical history. The JPSO Band of Excellence will be under the purview of the JPCCC because of its successful track record in working with youth—especially at-risk youth—in the parish.

Last summer, Brinson was chosen among eight finalists for the director position. Having spent over 25 years teaching at West



Jefferson High School, John Curtis Christian School and various K-12 schools in the Orleans Public School System, as well as at the University of New Orleans and Fort Valley State University, Brinson has unparalleled experience in building music programs from the ground up.

Band member Joshua Ward, 15, was on the verge of expulsion from West Jefferson High when the principal tapped Brinson to mentor him. He always did love the trumpet, so Brinson encouraged him to learn to play and keep at it. "Mr. Brinson influenced me to play the trumpet. The trumpet lets me express myself. I get a joyous feeling when I play," he said. Darlene Ward, Joshua's mom, said being a member of the Band of Excellence has been a positive experience. She touts the program's emphasis on

responsibility and accountability. "It's like he's going from a boy to a man. He's keeping busy constructively, which is good."

With goals for the program in place, Brinson has spent the majority of his time as director for the Band of Excellence designing parameters for the band and conducting outreach into the community—identifying grant and sponsorship opportunities, working with colleges and universities and putting together an abbreviated program for the summer.

"We want to build a foundation for success through education. We are already working with colleges to have their band members act as counselors for our program. In return for college credit or community service hours, these mentors will provide guidance during college application and admissions processes as well as aid in the

transition to college life," Brinson said.

Eventually Brinson hopes to partner with colleges throughout the Gulf South and even beyond to recruit mentors.

The first 30 members of the band made its debut at the Jefferson Parish Cops and Clergy Coalition's event with Crimestoppers on May 7. According to retired deputy chief Richard Rodrigue, for logistical and performance reasons, the initial band members have already had some training in music. But he noted that the full band will include a cross section of youth throughout the parish, both those who want to refine their musical skills and those who have talent and are interested in performing, but have not had any formal training.

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Brinson said they will look at different variables when deciding admission into the band program. "Our goal is to provide opportunities for kids who would not normally be exposed to music due to socio-economic reasons and provide opportunities for the more experienced musicians to perfect their skills."

Plans are for the band to perform at events throughout the city, at conventions, sporting events such as Saints, Hornets and Zephyrs games, and parades. Brinson also hopes to expand to national and even international performances that do not conflict with the academic calendar.

"The Band of Excellence is a homegrown product. Louisiana food is not the only thing that brings us international recognition, it is also our music," he said.

In addition to more public venues, Brinson plans to have band members visit nursing homes to entertain residents. "I want them to recognize the power they have to help people and make them smile when they perform. While it is a great pleasure to perform, we want to emphasize the social responsibility we all have to make a difference in others' lives."

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According to Rodrigue, because the band relies on private funding and grants, the program will grow in proportion to monies raised. "We had a fundraising event on May 26th at the Whole Foods Market in Metairie which was a huge success. Whole Foods dedicated five percent of the day's revenue to the band," he said. "The band also provided entertainment and charmed shoppers as they paraded through the aisles. Their presence raised awareness of what we are trying to do. Shoppers responded with their own donations as well."

Two additional businesses are aiding in the

and those with musical experience will be able to audition for first chairs. Finally, candidates are placed and notified.

Brinson notes that once admitted into the Band of Excellence, members will remain a part of the program (barring dismissal for contract violations) until they graduate from high school.

A Message from the Sheriff


With two public appearances under its belt, the JPSO Band of Excellence has finally come to fruition. And while the program is still in its infancy, the goals of the program are already being achieved.
